### PROGRAM UPDATE

At the time this is being written 96% of Class of 2013 graduates have contacted us to share the good news that they have passed their certification exam! Throughout the program these students contributed to patient care, research and our profession. This year's graduates have had several research project manuscripts published in various peer reviewed journals. Twenty-one members of the graduated class participated in poster presentations at the 2012 Annual National Meeting in San Francisco. As I reflect on the past year I feel very blessed that we have such dedicated, wonderful didactic and clinical instructors who participate in the students' educational and research journey.

This year eight research posters (Class of 2014) were accepted for the 2013 Annual Meeting in Las Vegas. One of the senior research projects has been accepted for the Fall MANA meeting's oral presentations and several seniors will participate in the MANA poster presentations. This fall's 39th Annual Mayo Clinic Seminar for Nurse Anesthetists will again provide opportunities for four oral research project presentations, while all seniors will participate in the Seminar's Alumni Poster Presentation session. The seniors and faculty hope that all of you will have an opportunity to attend at least one of the previously listed meetings and see the results of the Class of 2014's research.

Thank you to those of you who have supported the Mayo Nurse Anesthetists' Alumni Association over the years. Your gifts of time, money and instruction have provided Mayo SRNAs opportunities to understand the responsibility they must accept to uphold the long tradition of exceptional Mayo educated nurse anesthetists. Following the Mayo Seminar Poster Judging session, the Alumni Poster Awards are presented. These awards serve to encourage quality nurse anesthesia research. Alumni who are not Mayo Rochester staff attending the seminar will be selected as judges for the November 1, 2013 MNA Student Poster Presentations.

This past year the two desktop Sympodiums (Smart Board Computers) purchased with the support of the Alumni Association allowed instructors and students to do

real-time drawing on PowerPoint slides, which can then be captured and sent to the Off-Campus SRNAs. Recently, the Alumni Association has agreed to purchase an Epidural and Spinal Injection Simulator model. This teaching tool will assist in teaching our students regional technique in preparation for their Off-Campus Rotation. Additionally, as more of our CRNAs participate in medical mission trips, they have found it useful to stop up and use the program's mannequins and other teaching tools to brush up on those technical skills they are not using on a regular basis.

Mayo's Off-Campus Rotation (OCR) sites continue to provide students with an understanding of anesthesia practice outside our large academic center and obtain regional anesthesia experience. The Red Cedar Hospital-Mayo Clinic in Menomonie, WI has just become our newest OCR site. Our first SRNA started their rotation on July 8, 2013. It is exciting to know that three of our alumni are part of that practice: Gram Cotton (2006), Alison Glapa (1990) and Kelly Jarvis-Ziehl (1982). Gram Cotton, CRNA, DNP, Red Cedar's Chief Anesthetist was instrumental in making this rotation a reality.

As the program continues to look for ways to enhance our students' clinical experiences, I would like to again extend an invitation to all of our alumni who work in a practice that could provide our students with great experience in general and regional anesthesia, to contact me: marienau.mary@mayo.edu (1-507-284-8331) to discuss providing your practice as a Mayo OCR site.

As the program moves towards the projected July, 2014 start date for the Doctorate of Nurse Anesthesia Practice (DNAP) program, our accreditation site visit was conducted on April 24 and 25, 2013. After an extremely thorough visit that verified the 1000 plus pages of documentation and narrative included in our program's accreditation self-study document, the visitors' exit report found that the program

was 100% in compliance with all of the COA Standards and reported no citations. The institution, MSHS, anesthesia department, program, faculty and students were all thrilled with the visitors'

report. The final length of accreditation will be determined at the COA's October Meeting. We hope to obtain the full ten year accreditation approval.

Once the accreditation visitors left and we celebrated for a few minutes, it was back to work on applications for the DNAP Entry-Into-Practice Program, the DNAP CRNA Post Graduate Degree Program, Distance Education, and Higher Learning Commission! All four were submitted August 1st, so much work outside our routine program activities continued. If all goes according to plan we will then receive re-accreditation for our Master Classes of 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017, for first year DNAP distance education courses, and approval to start both our DNAP program with year I hybrid distance education and our limited CRNA degree completion DNAP programs in July, 2014.

We very much want our doctorate program to be relevant to nurse anesthetists. The program's core faculty is working to incorporate required "Essential" content into our DNAP program using four existing WSU DNP courses and nurse anesthesia application. The WSU contracted courses will be team taught using WSU instructors (2/3 of the course: online portion) and CRNAs (1/3 of the course: face-to-face portion) who are doctorally prepared or are in a doctorate program. Currently the core faculty and staff is made up of Chris Dietz (Associate Program Director- 0.8 FTE), Sharon Brandt (Clinical Education Coordinator - 0.8 FTE), Erin Martin (Core Didactic Instructor- 0.6 FTE), David Moses (Core Didactic Instructor-Technology - 0.2 FTE), Matthew Koedam, (core didactic instructor- 0.6 FTE), Administrative Assistants: Tammy Neis (1.0 FTE), Julie Predmore (0.6 FTE), Michelle Rahman (0.5FTE) and myself (Program Director of Nurse Anesthesia Education- 1.0 FTE).

As part of our faculty development and enhancement of our communication flow between the Program and clinical areas a Core Clinical Educator Group was selected from CRNAs in all Rochester clinical rotations. This group of ~ 30 CRNAs has been meeting once a month and working between meetings on projects that will enhance CRNAs ability to effectively instruct and evaluate SRNAs and mentor fellow CRNA clinical instructors. A

Core Clinical Group project that is planned for implementation in September is a monthly CRNA Journal Club. It will be hosted by a different clinical area each month on campus sites except twice a year it will take place at an off-campus site. CEUs will be available for those meetings.




Kathleen West graduated in 1998 and lives in

# CRNA WAR EXPERIENCE SHARED IN LOCAL NEWSPAPER

The war in Vietnam ended more than 40 years ago; the Paris Peace Accords ended hostilities on Jan. 27, 1973. Shortly after, by March 29, all U.S. troops were withdrawn from South Vietnam.

But today, war tourism is a driving force in Vietnam's burgeoning economy. Part of this driving force is the return of hundreds — perhaps thousands — of American military veterans to the areas of war that are forever etched in their memories.

One of these veterans, Steve Lee, of Rochester, was a member of a Post-Bulletin-sponsored cruise group that recently visited wide areas of Southeast Asia, including Vietnam.


Lee wasn't all that interested in reliving his Vietnam experiences at first. These "experiences" resulted in Lee being awarded a Bronze Star and Purple Heart. But he admitted to being talked into taking the trip by his wife, Felisa.

"I'm glad she did, though, and I think she felt it would bring closure" to his experiences, he said.

### Action seen

Lee, a Kenyon native, was drafted into the Army in June 1969 and sent to Vietnam in November, when the conflict was at its height. He spent a year there as a member of the famed "Lightning Division" — the 25th Infantry Division. Lee was a driver of an armored personnel carrier. He remembers well an incident when the APC he was driving hit a land mine, and he sustained cuts and burns, as well as a leg injury, earning him a Purple Heart. He was awarded a Bronze Star for his part in a mission at Black Virgin Mountain, near Tay Ninh. After his Vietnam duty, Lee served six months in Germany.

Lee and his wife, both retired Mayo Clinic nurse anesthetists, made the most of the cruise stops in Vietnam — there were four of them, and most of the trip was devoted to those excursions.



The tunnels — part of a three-story network that ends many miles away, near the Cambodian border — were the location of several military campaigns during the war and were the Viet Cong's base of operations for the Tet offensive in 1968. The tunnels, hand-dug in the 1940s when the Vietnamese were fighting the Japanese, were used as hiding spots during combat as well as serving as communication and supply routes, hospitals, food and weapon caches and living quarters for numerous guerrilla fighters.

### Underground attraction

Now, the tunnels are among the country's top tourist attractions, and the mainstays of Vietnam's war tourism promotions. An estimated 1,000 persons per day enter the tunnels to get a look at conditions, which are pretty much unchanged from years ago, although they have been widened to accommodate tourists.

There are many other areas of war tourism, and the most notable to us was the infamous Hanoi Hilton. That was the ages-old prison where Arizona senator and former presidential candidate John McCain spent several years as a prisoner after being shot down in his fighter plane.

There are other war-driven remnants in the country, including war museums, wrecked tanks and trucks that are still visible, abandoned hangars that once held helicopters and bombers and barbed wire around former landing strips.

### New names

But there have been changes, particularly with names. Many in Vietnam call it the American War, not the Vietnam War. And now, it's Ho Chi Minh City, not Saigon. It was the Museum of American War Crimes before it was renamed The War Remnants Museum. The South Vietnam President's Palace is now the Reunification Palace.

And, of course, North and South are no longer separate. All of these changes came about when North Vietnam took over the country a few years after the war ended.

But there are other changes, too. China Beach, a rest-and-rehabilitation area for GIs during the war, is now the home of a thriving vacation region for foreigners, and there is a new Hilton Hotel — of the luxury variety — that is popular in Hanoi.

So what did Lee think of all of the changes?

"There seems to be a lot more people," he said. "There are many shops along the roads, and the roads are vastly improved. Most striking were the hotels and improved tourism facilities at China Beach, located in a coastal area near Danang."

### Lots of traffic

Hanoi is a hornet's nest of traffic — motorbikes, cars, bikes, you name it, and virtually no one pays attention to traffic lights. The story we were told is that you are much better off taking a taxi to cross the street than trying to navigate yourself.

There's no question that Vietnam is becoming "Americanized." Starbucks is opening its first outlet in the country, at Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon. But they may face a tough time marketing their product, with French-inspired coffee reigning supreme in the country. That coffee, made from ballsy robusta beans, packs a stronger caffeine wallop than Starbucks'.
