#### PROGRAM UPDATE

What an inspiring year this has been. Our celebration of 125 years of Nurse Anesthesia education at the Mayo Clinic has continued on through the 41st Annual Mayo Clinic Nurse Anesthesia Seminar and even into the Class of 2016's graduation. We thought we were finished with celebrations for a little while, but shortly after graduation we received word that the US News and World Report ranking of nurse anesthesia programs across the country placed us in a multiple tie for 10th place. It is an honor to have the program, students, graduates and faculty recognized in this ranking.

The 25 members of the Class of 2016 graduated on March 12 in Phillips Hall with over 400 guests and faculty in attendance. They were reminded that being a professional requires embracing change. Change is a constant in our profession and it is important in many aspects to accept it in order to continue to grow. Katie Jacobsen, CRNA, MNA, invited graduation speaker, also encouraged the graduates to remember that "what you do every day as a CRNA matters. Each day's choices shape what you will become and replenish the reserves you will have to draw on when you need them."

Several of the 2016 graduates continued the tradition of getting their master's research published in peer reviewed journals. All students presented their research results via poster presentations at one or more of the following venues: The 2015 Annual AANA Congress in Salt Lake City, the Fall MANA State Meeting, and the 41st Annual Mayo Clinic Seminar for Nurse Anesthetists. Graduates also provided oral presentations at the 2015 MANA and Mayo meetings.

Over the years, the Nurse Anesthesia Alumni Association has gifted the program with exceptional teaching tools and equipment. Those gifts have been very much appreciated and valued by the program and students. To continue to enhance the educational experience for our students, the program has asked the Association to consider a future gift of an Interscalene/Supraclavicular Block Trainer: \$3644 and/or a Femoral Nerve Block Trainer: \$3398, when funds allow. Although these are significant purchases, we are confident they would be wonderful additions to the program's teaching tools. Through the generosity of Mayo Nurse Anesthesia Alumni, we were once again able to present Alumni Awards at graduation and during the Annual Mayo Seminar for Nurse Anesthetists, which help to encourage students to reach for higher professional and research aspirations. Your contributions make those awards possible.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind Mayo Alumni who do not work at Mayo Rochester and plan to attend the Annual Mayo Seminar (October 30-November 2, 2016), that you may be invited to be a poster judge for the Tuesday, November 1, 2016 Poster Session. If asked please say, "Yes!" It is a great, inexpensive way to give back to our program and profession. Please note that the Seminar starts on Sunday afternoon and will continue through Wednesday. We know it is being held over Halloween, but we are looking at the agenda to provide an earlier end time on October 31st.

Student Happenings: The students all enjoyed moving to the next level of their education this spring with a new tradition of "Dot Day." This is a rite of passage for students, as they receive a different colored 'dot' sticker on their nametags, to signify a progression in their educational journey. We continue to hold All-Student Meetings twice a year. The fall meeting includes an Anesthesia Bowl and this year in the final round, the SRNAs took the golden laryngoscope trophy away from the faculty ~ students be warned, we'll be taking it back next year!

We recognize that our current seniors (Class of 2017) will be celebrated in history as the last cohort of students to earn their Master of Nurse Anesthesia degree from our program. In mid-July we will admit our third DNAP class. It is amazing to realize that we are at this point in time of historical transitions in the program.

Mayo's Off-Campus Rotation (OCR) sites continue to provide students with an understanding of anesthesia practice outside a large academic center. These sites are also where students obtain needed regional anesthesia experience. Along with the two recently added sites in Red Wing, MN and Albert Lea, MN, all our OCR sites are providing SRNAs with a wonderful variety of experiences. With that said, the program continues to work to meet and exceed accreditation requirements and look for ways to enhance our students' clinical experiences. 

## FAMILY AFFAIR

#### Marcia and Craig Kluck

As a part of the Alumni Committee, we take turns writing different exposes for the newsletter. The biographical topics for this publication were Marcia and Craig Kluck. Chelsey: \*laughing\* No Dad. I mean, when you're outside of work. Craig: On my bicycle, commuting. Or at the lake, working in my shed.

## A LOOK BACK...

## FLORENCE HENDERSON NURSE ANESTHETIST, OPEN DROP ETHER SPECIALIST AND EDUCATOR



Florence Henderson, (1874-1956), served as nurse anesthetist for Dr. Charles H. Mayo, a surgeon at St. Marys Hospital, Rochester, MN who with his brother, William, founded the Mayo Clinic.

Born in Illinois and raised in Seward, NE, Henderson graduated from Bishop Clarkson Hospital Training School for Nurses in Omaha in 1900. As superintendent of nurses she taught in the school and learned to administer ether and chloroform anesthetics. Hired by the Drs. Mayo in 1904, Henderson moved to Rochester joining in practice with Alice Magaw, (1860-1928), who up until then the only nurse anesthetist at Saint Marys Hospital. Under Magaw's expert mentorship Henderson became an ether specialist.

At a nurse alumnae convention in 1909, Henderson emphasized the importance of nurse specialists in delivering anesthetics and debated the use of ether vs nitrous oxide anesthesia with Agatha Hodgins, CRNA (future founder of the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists), and a nitrous oxide specialist.

In 1913, Henderson, influenced by Alice Magaw's earlier papers and teaching, wrote and presented her paper 'Ether Anesthesia' before the Southern Minnesota Medical Association. She was one of 16 speakers and the only nurse. Henderson described her refined technique of open drop ether and defended its use and qualities. Her paper was later published in the St. Paul Medical Journal.



Henderson considered the use of ether alone or combined with local anesthesia to be the safest method within her practice and yielded the most satisfactory results for the surgeon. Her teamwork with Dr. Charles H. Mayo over 10 years required a very dependable anesthetic for his predominant specialty of thyroid and goiter operations. Henderson stressed the importance of vigilance, frequency of practice and the use of suggestion to gain the confidence of the patient and smooth the excitement phase of the ether induction. A dependable anesthetic by a skilled anesthetist unquestionably contributed to the advancement of modern surgical techniques.

During Henderson's career at the Mayo Clinic she gave over thirteen thousand anesthetics and as chief nurse anesthetist taught many nurses her open drop ether technique. Henderson moved to California in 1917 and worked for a group of surgeons in Los Angeles, retiring from anesthesia practice in the 1920s. She was a key witness in the 1930s trial of Dagmar Nelson vs. Chalmers–Francis, which established the delivery of anesthetics as a nursing specialty. Henderson died in 1956 and is buried in the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery, Seward, NE.
