### Mayo Clinic CRNA Alumni Update



Welcome to the Gonda Building, the new "front door" of Mayo Clinic. Located in the heart of the downtown campus, the building opened in October 2001. It is the centerpiece of the most extensive building program in Mayo Clinic history. The 20-story building is linked with the Mayo Building and the Charlton Building of Rochester Methodist Hospital, forming the largest interconnected medical facility of its kind in the world, more than 3.5 million square feet.

The building supports innovative and evolving hospital and clinic activities, including outpatient examinations, treatments and procedures, sameday surgery, intensive and step-down hospital care, patient-focused research, and education for patients and staff.

Diagnostic and treatment facilities are located in close proximity, enabling teams of specialists to work in centers of care. To patients, this translates into greater convenience, efficiency, and more "seamless" episodes of care.

The Gonda Building was constructed in two phases. Phase I includes subway level through the tenth floor. Phase II features shell space for seven additional clinical floors and was built along with the initial phase. In the future, the building could be expanded to 30 stories.

Currently the Outpatient Surgery Center is located on Gonda 7 and is run by the anesthesia department. There are four operating rooms and eight procedure rooms. Care is provided for 40-60 patients a day who receive conscious sedation or general anesthesia for a variety of minimally invasive procedures. Feedback from patients indicates it is an optimal setting for outpatient care.

#### MSHS Master of Nurse Anesthesia Program Update

This has been another busy year for the Nurse Anesthesia Program. We submitted our Program Self-Study to the Council on Accreditation the first part of March and welcomed three site reviewers to our campus April 22-23. After extensive review of documents and files, tours of the campus, observation in the ORs, meeting with most of the administrative staff, faculty and students they provided us with a very favorable report. We will not receive our final accreditation status until after the September meeting of the full Council on Accreditation; but we are hopeful that we will receive the maximum period of accreditation.

The re-sequencing of classes has been instituted with excellent results. One big change was moving the Anatomy course to the winter. The move has allowed both the first year (Anatomy course) and second year (Regional/Pain course) students to utilize our cadaver lab.

We are very fortunate that Albert Lea, Austin, Fairmont, MN and Jacksonville, FL continue as one of the 8 week off-campus rotation sites for the senior students. The two Rochester hospitals do an amazing job of providing the other 22 months of clinical experiences and instruction for the students.

The senior students are anxiously awaiting news as to which posters will be accepted for presentation at the National Meeting. We expect that we will have great representation in Seattle. This fall all of the senior research posters will be exhibited at the 30th Annual

Mayo Clinic Nurse Anesthesia Seminar. If you are in attendance at either meeting, the students will be pleased to have you stop and view their posters.

There has been another name change for the Nurse Anesthesia Program. It is now even longer! The official name of our program is The Mayo Clinic College of Medicine, School of Health Sciences Master of Nurse Anesthesia Program.

#### **Graduation 2004**

On March 12, 2004 graduation ceremonies were held for the 30 members of the Class of 2004 and for one CRNA Master Degree Completion graduate. Again this year, with over 400 people in attendance, Phillips Hall was full.

#### Edith Graham Mayo Mayo Clinic's First Nurse Anesthetist

Our first alumnus was Edith Graham Mayo. Her contribution to Mayo has often been associated with

her role as wife of Dr Charlie Mayo. A study of her life, as Mayo's first student anesthetist and then nurse anesthetist, was made by Darlene Bannon and Evadne Edwards, recent program graduates. Evadne and Darlene's research uncovered Edith's original 1889 handwritten OR notebook. The pocket notebook actually contained a list of items (including an ether cone) needed to set up the new hospital's operating rooms. This historical document was found at the Olmsted Historical Society in an un-catagorized packet.

Edith was taught to deliver anesthesia by the Doctors Mayo. Edith's success as a Nurse Anesthetist Educator was reflected by the achievements of her students. One of her students was Alice Magaw. Alice Magaw was called the "Mother of Anesthesia" by the Drs Mayo; a title widely accepted nationwide.

After her marriage to Dr Charlie Mayo, Edith no longer worked as a nurse/ nurse anesthetists but she continued to be involved in the work of St Mary's Hospital (Mayo Clinic). She also was very involved in civic activities and her role as a mother. In 1940 she was named American Mother of the Year. During that era, that award was considered one of the highest honors one could receive as a woman. Throughout Edith's lifetime additional honors were bestowed upon her.

In recognition of her contribution to the nursing profession a bronze statue stands in the courtyard at St Marys Hospital. The statue was the first statue erected in the United States to honor a nurse (a nurse anesthetist!).

In many aspects, Edith was a woman ahead of her time. She sought out a profession when few women ventured out of their motherhood and wife roles. She became a very respected nurse anesthetist, nurse, civic leader, teacher and protector of women and children. Edith Graham Mayo has provided all of us with solid roots for our family tree of Mayo Nurse Anesthetists.


