Feith Family Mayo Statuary Park

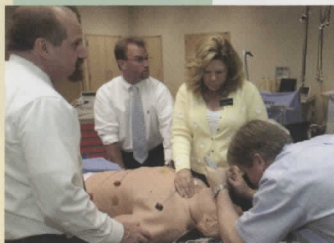
In October of 2004 Feith Family Mayo Statuary Park was dedicated during Heritage Days. The park is located across from the main, (west), entrance to the Gonda Building. It offers a place for patients, visitors and staff to relax, spend time outdoors and celebrate Mayo's heritage.

The partnership that began more than a century ago between the Mayo's and the Sisters of Saint Frances is honored in the park through two statues – a 1915 statue of Dr William Worrall Mayo, which was refurbished, and a new statue of Mother Alfred Moses. A sculpture of Drs. Will and Charlie Mayo, based on a familiar photograph of the brothers sitting on the steps of their former home, also grace the park.

Mayo Benefactors John and Elizabeth Feith of Saukville, Wisconsin helped make the park a reality. The Feith Family Park has decorative stone walls, planters and benches. The park contains landscaping that will endure all of Minnesota's seasons. Throughout the year people are visible gazing at the statues, reading the inscriptions or just reading a book while having lunch. The Park truly adds rich heritage and welcome serenity to its surroundings.



Cutting-edge Technology



In November of 2005 an official open house was held at the new Multidisciplinary Simulation Center. The center will use art to imitate life. Cutting-edge technology will offer medical professionals real-life scenarios for hands-on learning. The center will be a resource for all Mayo training programs and clinical departments.

Participants can practice and master skills such as procedures, professionalism, communication and teamwork, as well as train together across disciplines to practice and perfect skills without ever putting patients at risk. Center designers believe that simulation training has great potential to further strengthen the Mayo Model of Care and advance quality and safety in medical practice.

As part of the nurse anesthesia program, students will be shown how to effectively use the center and be given time in the center to work on their skills. Mary Marienau, program director, has been an integral part of the center and plans to have students utilize it as another effective learning tool.

The Multidisciplinary Simulation Center is located on the first floor of the Stabile building on the Mayo Campus in Rochester.

MSHS Master of Nurse Anesthesia Program Update

The Nurse Anesthesia Program continues to evolve and look for ways to better educate our students in the classroom and in the clinical settings. After reviewing input from prior students and clinical area instructors, we chose to implement a gradual transition into the ORs. This year we scheduled our first year students in the ORs earlier than previous master frontloaded classes. Students started in the ORs two mornings and/or afternoons per week starting in mid- January. That clinical schedule continued until March. During the month of March the SRNAs returned full-time to the classroom to complete their frontloaded courses along with ACLS and PALS. Just prior to returning to their full-time (5 days per week) clinical orientation, the SRNAs spent three days in the Simulation Center brushing up on their anesthesia induction, maintenance and emergence skills, along with their anticipatory and emergent case management skills. This was the first time the program used the Simulation Center for such a structured activity. Both faculty and student

groups agreed that it was a worthwhile experience. We are starting to include the Simulation Center in our curriculum for all levels of learners.

September 2005 we welcomed 26 new students into the program. We have selected another 26 RNs to start the program this September. Although there are many Mayo employees in each class, we also continue to welcome SRNAs from across the country. Currently there are three CRNAs enrolled in the CRNA Degree Completion Program.

This past year seventeen senior students presented their research project posters at the AANA National Meeting (Washington, DC). This year all poster submissions were selected for presentation at the Cleveland AANA Meeting. We are very pleased that there will be six Mayo Posters at that meeting. One research group was chosen, as one of 10 research projects selected from all of the National AANA meeting submissions, to also provide a State of the Science: New Research Findings oral presentation. This coming October, all of the seniors will exhibit their posters at the State MANA Meeting and again at the 32nd Annual Mayo Clinic Nurse Anesthesia Seminar.

Faculty News:

This year Sharon Brandt, CRNA, MNA, Clinical Coordinator for the Master of Nurse Anesthesia Program, received the Mayo School of Health Sciences' Outstanding Educator Award. Among her many valuable contributions to the program and students, it was noted that she was instrumental in the successful implementation of our evaluation, case numbers and care plans computerized programs. She also has been identified as an outstanding clinical educator.

Evaluation of Esophageal Temperature for Patients Undergoing Percutaneous Circumferential Pulmonary Vein Radiofrequency Ablation

Introduction:

Circumferential pulmonary vein ablation (CPVA) is an effective and relatively safe procedure for treating Atrial Fibrillation. CPVA is not without risk, rapid increases in temperature were noted during the CPVA procedures by Pappone. Pappone et al. discussed two case studies of atrio-esophageal fistulas and indicated the need for further evaluation of procedure temperature changes. The objective of this retrospective chart review was to determine whether an esophageal temperature increase occurred during general anesthesia for percutaneous circumferential pulmonary vein radiofrequency ablation (CPVA).

Methods:

A retrospective descriptive chart review was conducted of one hundred fifteen patients undergoing CPVA procedures under general anesthesia at Mayo Clinic Rochester, from

September 2003 to September 2004. Esophageal temperature probes used during general anesthesia were placed in proximity to the radio frequency ablation catheter. Serial esophageal temperature recordings were analyzed to determine if significant increases occurred.

Results:

Seventy-seven out of one hundred fifteen patients demonstrated a significant temperature increase of 0.8 degrees Celsius or higher within a one minute interval.

Conclusions:

The information gained from this study may help the anesthesia provider more accurately assess the cause of hyperthermia during the CPVA procedure. Possible anesthetic considerations for a temperature rise could indicate whether the increase is transient from the ablation itself, or resulting from a hypermetabolic state.

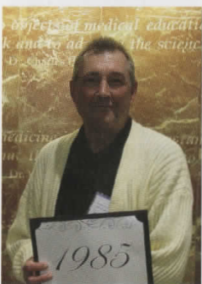

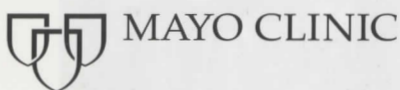
