- April 1, 1924 was the official start of a Section on Regional Anesthesia and coincided with the recruitment of Dr. John Lundy from Seattle
- The section underwent three name changes between 1931 and 1960, eventually becoming the Department of Anesthesiology in 1970

Thirty-Five Years of Anesthesia Before the Section Designation

- Edith Graham, the future Mrs. Charlie Mayo, was taught by Dr. William Worrell Mayo, to give anesthesia for his sons in 1889
- Subsequently, Edith trained Alice Magaw to deliver anesthesia; she became known as "the mother of anesthesia"
 - Her 1906 publication of zero deaths from ether anesthesia set a high bar for anesthesia safety for nearly a century.
- Alice Magaw and Florence Henderson subsequently delivered more than 25,000 anesthetics between 1893 and 1917

Physicians Providing Anesthesia in the Pre-Section Years


- Dr. Isabella Herb (1899-1904): Mayo Clinic's first physician anesthetist, working primarily with Dr. Charlie Mayo
- Dr. Gaston Labat (September 1920-October 1921): The primary catalyst for the use of regional anesthesia in North America
- Dr. William Meeker (1921-1923): Trained with Dr. Labat in regional anesthesia; trained as a surgeon subsequently



- Advocacy for regional anesthesia in the U.S.
- First clinical anatomy lab in the U.S.
- Introduction of sodium pentothal
- First clinical blood bank in the U.S.
- Advocacy for the use of postoperative recovery rooms
- Development of the first postoperative intensive care units
- WW II training of physicians in a short course for anesthesia
- Development of the Tuohy needle and neuraxial catheter techniques
- Introduction of the first iv catheter-over-a-needle
- Hemoglobin transfusion trigger
- Insights into the impact of glucose on the ischemic brain

- Development of the Mayo-Gibbons heart-lung machine
- First uses of EEG for intraoperative brain monitoring
- Discovery of the etiology of halothane hepatitis
- Understanding of pulmonary mechanics, anesthesia, and positioning
- First use of the term, "neuroanesthesia" and development of the subspecialty
- First use of intrathecal narcotics for clinical care
- Delineation of succinylcholine and its issues with burns, hyperkalemia, and malignant hyperthermia
- Clarity on anticoagulation use and neuraxial techniques

The Mayo Three-Shield Emblem

- Rochester "Pill Hill" parties were fashionable in the mid-1970s on Saturdays after long work weeks
- In 1975, Dr. **Brian Dawson** and his wife, **Sonja**, hosted a party at their home directly across the street from the former home of Dr. Will Mayo (i.e., the Foundation House)
 - At that party, Mayo librarian Tom Keys noted Brian's British medical school shield and Sonja suggested that Mayo should also have a shield
- Sonja put pen-to-napkin during the party and promptly designed Mayo's three intersecting shields
 - She intended for the shields to represent Drs. William Worrell, Will, and Charlie Mayo
 - The Mayo Board of Governors loved the idea but wanted the shields to represent clinical practice, education, and research, the 3 Mayo Clinic missions
